SOUP KITCHEN HEROES

Many of the grown-ups in 7-year-old Anthony's community in Peru struggle to find jobs. There just aren't a lot of them to go around, and when they do find work, it usually doesn't even pay enough to buy groceries.

That's why Anthony's mom, Luz, and other parents from Anthony's Compassion center decided to set up a soup kitchen, to make sure every family got at least one good meal a day.

Now, families bring a donation of food, like potatoes or corn, and Anthony and his mom work together to make a big pot of soup for everyone to share. Because people like Anthony's sponsor helped his family, Anthony and Luz can also help others!

"We're humble people, and maybe it has been worse in other homes, I don't know. But thanks to Anthony's sponsor and you all, we have something to eat," says Luz. "Thanks for helping us when we need it most. May God keep giving you more!"

Before the soup kitchen started, Anthony felt lonely and sad a lot. But now, he has something to look forward to every day!

6-YEAR-OLD TRANSLATOR

Maria Eunice lives in Brazil with her mom and dad. But there's something special about her home. It is very quiet. That's because both of Maria's parents are deaf. She is the only person in her home who can hear or speak.

And at just 6 years old, Maria is her mom and dad's ears and mouth. She began learning sign language when she was just 1 year old, and now she is a huge help to her parents.

"Because I'm the only person who can understand them, my parents need me wherever they go because I'm the only one who can translate what they say to other people," says Maria. "So, when they go to the bank, I go with them. When they go to the market, I go with them. When my aunt calls my mom, I also translate for her. It's tiring, but I like helping them."

It's a big job for a little girl. But Maria loves that she is able to help her mom and dad in such a big way!

FIVE HANDFULS OF RICE

One of Keysha's favorite Bible stories is when Jesus fed 5,000 people with only five loaves of bread and two fish. It reminds her that Jesus can take our small actions and gifts and make BIG changes!

Keysha knew that 5,000 people was a lot — she didn't even know that many people! But in her community in Indonesia, Keysha had seen lots of elderly people who didn't have enough to eat. So at her Compassion center, Keysha invited her tutor and friends to each bring in five handfuls of rice and as much spare change as they could give.

In just one month, Keysha and her friends collected more than 150 pounds of rice and \$40! Immediately, Keysha knew the first person she would help.

"I felt so sad when I saw a grandmother we visited who lives alone. She is blind, very old and needs help from others," says Keysha. "But now, I feel joy. I know that she will not be starving because she has rice."

Keysha even inspired the grown-ups around her, who started a monthly collection to help those in need. Her small action changed a lot of people's lives!

HELP like JESUS

RACE FOR THE GIFTS

GOAL

In this game, players work together to send at least four different types of gifts to a family living in poverty. But you have only 12 turns to do it, so choose wisely.

MATERIALS

- 4 player tokens (use coins, game pieces or very small toys)
- a handful of dried beans (or small items like little Lego pieces, beads or unpopped popcorn kernels)

PLAYERS: 1-4

If playing with fewer than four people, take turns to play all four players.



SETUP

Place the **player tokens** on the starting spaces and choose who will play as each.

Place a bean on the \$0 space of the **Funds Tracker**.

Starting with Player 1, take turns moving your player tokens around the board. On every turn, the player must move one space in any direction.

There are two types of spaces you can land on:

FUNDRAISING SPACES. These are where you earn your money. When you land on one, add the money to your total by moving the bean on the Funds Tracker. Then place a bean on the space.

a gift spaces. When you land on a gift space, choose whether to buy the gift (if you have enough funds). If you do, subtract the amount from your Funds Tracker and then place a bean on the Gifts Tracker. Place a bean on the gift space. If you don't buy the gift, your turn ends and no bean is placed on the space.

Beans: No player can land on or move through a space with a bean on it. Choose your moves carefully and don't get trapped!

After the first player finishes their turn, put a bean on the first circle in the "turns" counter.

Move it by one spot every time a player finishes a turn. Once the counter bean reaches the final circle or you collect four gift types, the game is over.

DID YOU COLLECT AT LEAST FOUR GIFT TYPES IN TIME? IF YOU DID, YOU WIN! IF NOT, TRY IT AGAIN!

How Would YOU Help?

Have you ever been in a situation where you weren't sure how to help someone? Sometimes it can be tricky to know exactly how to act like Jesus would want us to — with kindness and compassion.

In this activity, the Compassion Explorer animal mascots find themselves in tricky situations. Circle what you think they should do to be the most helpful. **But here's** a twist: Before you choose your answer, act out each possible situation with a family member or friend! For example, you play the role of Sloth and your dad plays Llama. **There are no right or wrong answers.** The point is to think and talk about how you could respond when someone needs help. Have fun acting out your roles and talking about your choices!

## **Growing Clean Water**

The plants we need for food need water to grow. So where there is a shortage of water, there will be a shortage of food, cleanliness and other important things.

For many children in developing countries, their families can't afford homes with running water. So they collect water from ponds, lakes or rivers that is filled with germs and makes them sick if they drink it. Also, many kids live far away from a water source and spend lots of time and energy walking to get there.

When 11-year-old Isaac learned about this during a Compassion activity at his church called Step Into My Shoes, he was determined to do something about the water problem. "Here, all we need is to turn on the tap and drink, but for many children across the world, they have to boil their water and that must be a pain," he shares.

Isaac had the brilliant idea to grow and sell plants to raise money. **Here are** some of the plants he grew to sell:

- basil
- roma tomatoes
- cherry tomatoes
- sunflowers

With the help of his mom, Stacey, Isaac was selling his plants daily. He was so excited that he video-journaled his journey to inspire other children to make a difference too.



Isaac successfully raised over \$1,000 for Compassion to buy 13 water filters for families in need! He wants other children to know, "You can make a difference no matter what your age is."

Have you ever broken a bone? Using crutches or a wheelchair can be quite uncomfortable (and probably even hurt a little)! And what happens when you need help doing the little things that used to be easy without your cast or crutches? Right?! You need people around you to help you.

In 2 Samuel, we learn about a man named Mephibosheth [meh-FEE-boe-sheth]. (Say that five times fast!) Mephibosheth was the son of Jonathan and the grandson of King Saul. When he was only 5 years old, he was dropped, and something terrible happened: He was no longer able to walk. He needed people to help him!

God provided the help that Mephibosheth needed. Once King David found out what happened to Mephibosheth, he wasted no time in bringing Mephibosheth into his care. Mephibosheth lived in King David's own house so that he could eat with him for the rest of his life. King David helped Mephibosheth!

Did you know that God wants you to help people too? Even though you're still young, God gives YOU opportunities to help those around you. You can bake food for the kids down the street whose dad just died. Or maybe there's a classmate who sits by himself at lunch every day. You can ask him to join you and your friends and then ask him to play with you at recess. You could even use your allowance to help sponsor a child through Compassion!

God is always with us to help us, and he wants us to look around and find other people to help too. So let's be like King David and look for ways to love those around us just like he did.
